We will:

- take steps to deepen our understanding of Eucharist and its centrality in our lives

We will continue to:

- promote further sharing, expanding, exploring of the Mercy Spirit as inspired by Catherine with co-workers and all who choose Mercy as a way of being in the world

- express our delight in and mutual support of the Mercy Associate entity.

We will:

- focus on social justice in a formalised way by:
 - > deepening our understanding of Catholic social justice principles
 - > becoming familiar with social justice issues through reading and group discussion
 - > participating in action for justice.

Seeds to be planted within and by the Congregation

Nourishing and planting seeds of **openness and enthusiasm** towards becoming part of a new canonical structure

Under the guidance of Institute leadership let us enthusiastically accept the challenge of finding a new way to live Mercy within the emerging structure.

Let us begin to 'try-on' our new identity as 'Bigger Mercy' as it emerges through our discussions and deliberations with the other congregations.

Grounded in a familiarity with our own oral history and culture, let us engender mutual welcome and openness among congregations.

Let us take the initiative to set up informal opportunities to come to understand, respect and value the diverse cultures that exist across congregations and the potential richness acquired as these cultures blend.

We will:

- record the oral history of our congregation in order to gain a deeper appreciation of our culture
- be enthusiastic participants in developing a new structure for the one canonical congregation
- engage appropriate facilitation in preparing for and coping with change in the living structure of the new congregation
- encourage and participate willingly in formal and informal networking with members of other congregations
- experiment with modes of operating that our new identity will entail as these emerge.
