25th NOVEMBER – A DAY WE NEED TO REMEMBER It is International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women.

We read in many articles that women and girls all over the world are especially vulnerable to particular types of violence such as domestic violence, incest, rape, people trafficking, female genital mutilation and 'honour crimes'.

One in three Australian women will experience physical or sexual violence in her lifetime. This is one of the most widespread and serious human rights abuses in Australia. (Australian Bureau of Statistics 2006) That figure also sums up the crisis confronting women throughout the world, but thanks to various activists a number of actions have been taken in an attempt to eliminate violence.



Personal Encounter:

One of our own women, **Sister Patricia McDermott RSM** (North Sydney) has been working with women in Peru for the last 12 years. Having heard the stories of domestic violence from so many women, she has witnessed how Luke 13: 10-18 can be a transforming moment for them. She states:

Rosa is one such woman – beaten by her husband for many years. But then, one day, hearing the courage of other women, she decided "Enough – I won't let him do it to me any more. I looked at the photo you had taken of me, all beaten and bruised. I couldn't deny it! From that moment, I could feel a new strength within me. I know I have dignity. I will not be beaten again. I can stand tall like the woman in the gospel – My life has changed and I want to help other women realise that they don't have to stay bent over and oppressed."

The UNIFEM REPORT 2003 states -

"In a relatively short time, women and their advocates have transformed the way gender-based violence is understood, and have promoted international documents and treaties that recognise, for the first time, women's right to live free of violence. We cannot change the basic structures of society overnight. But each step in the ongoing effort to eradicate violence puts more pressure on those who condone the violence and allow it to exist. Each step makes it harder to ignore the international agreements to protect and promote women's human rights. This is the moment for a renewed commitment to build on the achievements of the last decades and find the resources for meaningful action." http://www.unifem.org/

WHITE RIBBON DAY (www.whiteribbonday.org.au/) was created by some Canadian men in 1991 on the second anniversary of one man's massacre of fourteen women in Montreal. They began the White Ribbon Campaign to urge men to speak out against violence against women.

On Wednesday 17th September Prime Minister Kevin Rudd presented the 2008 White Ribbon Ambassador Award and announced funding for research and analysis of Australian community attitudes towards violence against women.

White Ribbons and wristbands are being sold to help raise awareness of violence against women.

Coinciding with Father's Day, results of a survey found that more than half of Australian men said their father had rarely or never spoken to them about avoiding violence in their personal relationships when they were growing up. A media release calls Aussie dads to speak out to help prevent violence.
