Inspiration behind the tour

Cycle Against The Traffik chose ACRATH VIC as the TOUR 2010 recipient of the fundraising. The tour was an initiative of Carolyn Merry as a response to her experience of work-

On arrival at Wollongong, a presentation was given to the Year II boys of Edmund Rice College about modern slavery and how they can participate in its eradication.



From Bateman's Bay the next stop was Narooma. Before reaching the destination they encountered "70 kms of fairly challenging hills."



On arrival, the team was welcomed by several local people who hosted them for the night. Carolyn showed a film in the Narooma Star of the Sea Church spreading the information about human trafficking.





On the journey to Sale, the team faced a "horrible headwind". With the encouragement of each other, they finally reached Sale where Carolyn headed straight into the ABC radio station to capture the issues of human trafficking for the listeners in that region.

The funds raised from 'Tour 2010' have been sent to Tenaganita (Women's Strength), an anti-trafficking NGO in Malaysia. The Tenaganita shelter is for women and children who have been trafficked, and ACRATH offers ongoing support for it. On the blog of the Cycle Against the Traffik on 5 September 2010, a touching message was received. It read:
