

Please note that National Reconciliation Week is preceded by National Sorry Day (Saturday 26 May), a day which acknowledges the removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children from their families and communities. The week officially ends with Mabo Day (Sunday 3 June) which marks the anniversary of the High Court of Australia’s judgement in the Merriam Island Land Claim, overturning the legal principle of *Terra Nullius*.

We are walking each other home....



In recent weeks I have engaged with the beauty and complexity of my own being and the being of others, through my experiences in the Philippines, Dublin and Ballarat in particular. A quote has grabbed my attention and encouraged pondering: 'We are walking each other home' (Ram Dass and Paul Gorman). It immediately conjured up images of Jesus and the two disciples on the road to Emmaus and of those who walk with me. I am reminded of the words from the Constitutions (2.01) of the Sisters of Mercy of Australia and Papua New Guinea, 'The tender mercy of God has given us one another.' If someone 'walks me home' I trust them enough to know where I live. I feel the companionship of sharing the journey, of inviting them into my home and all the deeper levels of sharing that that may mean. It speaks of intimacy, openness, hospitality, of love... We are walking each other home. It strikes me that we do this for myriad reasons and hopefully the journey brings me, us, closer to the Source who is our home, through our own particular call to Mercy.

Pope Francis in his latest exhortation *Gaudete Et Exsultate* calls us to see the entirety of our lives as mission. He reminds us that the important thing is that each of us 'discerns her own path, that she brings out the very best of herself, the most personal gifts that God has placed in her heart rather than hopelessly trying to imitate something not meant for her...' We are walking each other home.

May this journey of walking each other home have you living deeply into 'the message of Jesus that God wants to speak to the world by your life.' (*Gaudete Et Exsultate* No. 24). May you discover again and again the beauty and complexity of loving companions who likewise are searching and just doing their best, their living out of their call. And finally I offer Rumi's words: 'Don't you know yet? It is your light that lights the worlds.'

Inaugural Commitment Ceremony for Toronto



On Saturday 5th May 2018 the Toronto Mercy Associates celebrated a commitment ceremony of eight new women and four women making a re-commitment. Certificates and badges were presented by Sr Mary Geason rsm, Community Leader Central B. The ceremony was held at Our Lady of the Lake House of Retreat, Toronto.

The theme of the ceremony was *All Are Welcome* so to commence our morning it seemed only fitting to start with an acknowledgment to country which was led by Sr Pat Adams rsm in the grounds overlooking Lake Macquarie. We returned indoors and gathered around our sacred space and sang *All Are Welcome* by Marty Haugen. As well as the eight new women we had four original Mercy Associates join us and seven Sisters of Mercy, a total of 18 women on the day. As a symbol of love from the Sisters and current Associates, hands were placed on the shoulder of each new Associate and a blessing using words from Catherine McAuley was shared.

A Gospel reading was shared – Luke 10:25-37, and a quiet personal reflection time was entered into after which open sharing was encouraged. Certificates and badges and a gift of a cup and saucer to each new Associate was presented. And last but not least, the sharing of a Cuppa Tea and of course sandwiches and scones. We had come together in celebration of our commitment as people of Mercy. Our commitment as Mercy Associates! Our commitment to continuing the work of Catherine McAuley and the Sisters of Mercy, whose example we carry in the Mercy we show and share with others.

The build up to this very special occasion commenced some three years back, when the long-running Mercy Associates group in Toronto decided to cease meeting. This original group had been running for over 25 years and I had commenced my association with this group some 18 years ago when I moved into the area from Wingham. The Sisters of Mercy, in particular Sisters Heather and Dorothy who at the time resided at the house, and the many women I was privileged to encounter over these years, were the inspiration for me to commence the gathering of a new group of Mercy Associates.

God had put it on my heart to encourage other women and in particular young women to come to this sacred space that I had gained so much love and mercy from. And with the support of Sr Anne Ryan rsm who was the Program Coordinator at the Toronto Mercy House, the journey to build our group began in 2015 and meetings were held on Saturday mornings every two months to allow working women to participate.

For the first few gatherings I presented a morning of reflection, meditation, sharing and of course a Cuppa Tea. In mid-2016 with the guidance of Sr Anne Ryan rsm it was decided we would study/share on Sr Madeline Duckett's book – 'Boots, Cracked Pots and a Place at the Table'. It was during the sharing of Madeline's book over a 12 month period that these women were encouraged to consider and later commit to becoming Mercy Associates. The formation process began and was run over six evenings using the new resources from the Institute.

The Toronto Mercy Associates welcome their newest members: Catherine Cunningham, Michelle Clipsham, Bev McWilliam, Vicki Hancock, Linda Brown, Meagan Soley, Jamie Soley and Geraldine Cairns.

Apollo Bay Commitment Ceremony

Here I am Lord, Is it I Lord? was the opening hymn on Commitment Day for the Mercy Associates.

How apt that hymn seemed.

A group of six women were to renew their commitment to Catherine McAuley's vision of Mercy and Love and a woman in her 70's was to make a first commitment.

Her decision unfolded this way.

When Sister Margaret noticed the woman reading a brochure about Catherine McAuley, a quiet invitation was extended to attend the twice monthly meetings of the Mercy Associates. For over a year this woman was greatly encouraged by the down-to-earth Christian faith and mutual respect evident in these meetings.

Because Apollo Bay is a small town, careful observation revealed much about the genuineness of the Mercy Associates' lives. All the women lived out their faith practically, humbly and with good humour, caring for people who experienced difficulty. Their own poor health or family concerns didn't quench their Christian faith or desire to seek the highest good of others.

One ebullient, hospitable woman decorated cakes to surprise people having special celebrations or she gave them bunches of flowers. Another baked scones for Op Shop volunteers and shut-ins. Five sang with a small choir visiting elderly hospital residents. Several were members of the local St Vincent's conference and all volunteered with school, sporting, refugee, church or community groups. One senior Associate, regardless of illness, continued to make her bed (this sometimes took an hour), rather than taking someone away from their '*more important*' activities.

On Commitment Day in April, the Mercy Associates were called, one-by-one, to stand, to face their congregation with the new one placed in the centre. Sister Margaret and Sister Liz's faces glowed with encouragement as a first commitment was spoken and acknowledgement of hearing God's call was given. The others renewed their commitment firmly and clearly. The entire congregation sang Catherine McAuley's Prayer in loving support.

And after ... the kindly Ballarat Associates who travelled 2 ½ hours to be with us, our spouses, local friends, Sisters Margaret and Liz, plus Father Wally, all shared a meal at the Top Pub. It was as though Catherine and Jesus were seated at our table – and perhaps they were!

Townsville Mercy Associate writes history of local Sisters of Mercy

A new book 'An Ardent Desire to be United to God and to Serve the Poor, A Celebration of 100 Years of the Sisters of Mercy in the Diocese of Townsville 1878-1978', written by Mercy Associate Joan Neal, was recently launched in Townsville.

The book launch brought together a crowd of 40 including Bishop Tim Harris, Gaye Lennon RSM, Helen White RSM, Joan and John Neal, Sisters of Mercy, representatives of St Patrick's College, the Mater Hospital and Mercy Community Services North Qld (MCSNQ), as well as friends of Joan and the Sisters.

Joan Neal gave thanks in her speech to the Sisters who contributed to this recording of history. She said:

"I am indebted to the Sisters who contributed to their story: Sister Cheryl Camp wrote Planting the Seeds around Cleveland Bay, Sister Benigna Desmond and Sister Aquinas preserved some of the story in the 1950s, Sister Marie Leonie Williams for the New Guinea story and her suggestions with the way the book is structured. Sister Annette Lowth spent many hours assisting and allowing me access to the archives. Sister Mary Raymond (Hammond) told me the wartime story must be told. Sister Marie Melville walked with me through difficult decisions – we decided 100 years was best. Sister Carmel Ruddick got the manuscript moving again in 2016, and Sister Anita Ready read and re-read and if I have errors in the story of the Irish sisters it is certainly my fault as Anita spent much time going over it with me. Sister Carmel King walked, lived and breathed the story and the photos with me for the last two years, I'm sorry Carmel is not able to be here today. Finally, Sister Ros Carr persuaded me to take this on – for it not to be a chatty local history, nor to be an academic exercise alone but to situate the story in the story of the church, North Queensland history and pioneering women. Thanks Ros."

Flora, Timor Leste

Where your treasure is, there your heart is also.

Greetings to Mercy Associates and Friends.

From time to time, many of us have been inspired by someone. For me, such a person is one of our Mercy Associates in Aileu, Timor Leste. With Flora's gracious approval her story will be shared with you in this edition.

Flora Falcoa is a young 23 year old Timorese woman whose family consists of ten children, Flora being the ninth. The eighth child, her sister is deceased as also are her parents. Despite all the tragedy this family has endured they remain happy, close knit and faith-filled. However, another cross was thrust upon them.

One day in 2013 whilst Flora was at school attending her final year, she went to stand up but fell to the ground. With help she was raised to her feet but fell to the ground repeatedly. Flora was diagnosed with an acute muscle weakness. The ongoing support of her family, physiotherapy, acupuncture, and medication have not given her the desired cure. She is unable to sit and can only walk short distances. Flora stands or lies down. Just imagine the enormous setbacks this situation poses for a housebound young woman.

Where to from here? How does Flora cope? Flora has often shared with me where she seeks grounds for hope. In seeking hope she speaks of God's infinite riches, love, mercy and patience particularly in her sufferings. The beauty and wonder of God's riches in that the divine well is inexhaustible - a mystery that continues to captivate Flora. How is Flora's sound sense of God nurtured?

Travel is not an option for Flora but she has made a most important journey, the journey inwards. Journeying inwards in silence through both suffering and stillness has touched her life

with calmness, joy, acceptance and a great assurance of our merciful God's presence. Flora has found her TREASURE. She has a direction for her life.

During her senior years at school Flora felt she had a calling to religious life. Imagine the struggle and huge disappointment of yet another cross! Always wanting to move forward Flora asked God, 'Please show me another way'.

Flora began to express an interest in finding out about the Mercy Associates. Within a short time Flora had found her calling - to experience the charism of mercy and endeavour to seek and live this call in her everyday life.

Prayer is Flora's chosen ministry as a Mercy Associate and she invites anyone wishing her to pray for an intention to contact via my email (Flora is without an email)

Townsville Mercy Associates hold Information Evening

A group of current and potential Mercy Associates met at the House of Prayer in Townsville on 22nd March to discuss the shape of the group in the future.

Following the Commitment ceremony held at the same location in February, Mercy Associates Executive Officer, Carmel Ross spoke to the group about the history of Mercy Associates around the world over the last thirty years, including the groups that have formed in Australia during that time. The Townsville group, which has members in distant locations as Winton, Proserpine, Collinsville and Bowen, is a long-standing group.

The history of the Townsville group was described by Marcia Chock Man. A particular point of interest was the badges – Marcia had retained her original Mercy Associates badge from over two decades ago, and now has the new badge presented across the Institute to Mercy Associates.



The meeting discussed the importance of the group moving to a model where Mercy Associates each took on roles to sustain the life of the group. The roles identified included maintaining the database of current and potential Mercy Associates, booking venues for future meetings, preparing a reflection and prayer for the meeting, and being vigilant in identifying and inviting

others who might be interested in becoming Mercy Associates. The other task that will arise is that of facilitating the formation programme for those at the meeting who are interested in becoming a Mercy Associate.

The group is appreciative of the contribution made by Sr Carmel King over many years. They were also pleased to have the encouragement of three other Sisters who attended this meeting. The model of involvement for Sisters, where their role changes from leading to becoming a mentor, was discussed.

Those present, who were from Townsville, agreed to meet again in July. They will maintain contact with those from beyond Townsville who have expressed an interest in being a Mercy Associate.
