Welcome ... as we live through challenging times...

Though 2020 is still young, it has already been a year of extraordinary challenges in our region and around the world. The bushfires in many states that raged for months have seriously disrupted the lives and well-being of tens of thousands of Australians. They will need years to rebuild their lives and regain some sense of hope in the future.

And now, in more recent weeks, the coronavirus, COVID-19, has gone from a newly-emerged human virus in a province in China to a highly-contagious disease spreading throughout most nations around the world. Its impact on those who catch the virus may be so severe as to lead to death, or so mild almost no symptoms are experienced. Yet even those of us who remain in good health are increasingly experiencing negative impacts on our day to day lives and we have no reason to believe this will pass soon.

When catastrophic events unfold, especially those that last for months and which are beyond human control, people can easily feel overwhelmed by their circumstances. Hope is fragile. Our faith tells us that faith, hope and love are gifts of God, freely given to us if we choose to accept them as blessings in our lives. Time spent in prayer and reflection helps us become closer to God's love and support.

In this edition, **Christine Convery** has shared a reflection that includes a David Haas poem about dealing with pain, an experience we will all encounter from time to time in our lives. (p. 5) During this season of Lent, reflecting on how we personally respond to pain—spiritual and/or psychological, is a topic of importance.

Recently the group spent two days together, with Anne O'Connell (Ballarat), Annette Rowe (Gladstone), Joan Neal (Townsville), Grace Soley (Toronto) and Helen Fowler (Young) attended, along with Christine Convery (NSW), Anne Pate (VIC), Carmel Ross (Executive Officer) and Ellen Geraghty (Director, Mission Integration) attending.

Four Institute Leadership Team members (Eveline Crotty, Gaye Lennon, Maureen Sexton and Liz Moloney) joined the group for dinner on Friday evening, 28 February at the Lewisham office.

Discussions over the weekend covered a broad range of topics:

- updates were provided on each group;
- ♦ the importance of prayer as a ministry of Mercy Associates;
- procedures for establishing new groups;
- the lower age limit for becoming a Mercy Associate;
- ♦ the 'life cycle' of groups;
- the challenges facing groups where Associates are ageing and the group no longer wants to meet formally;
- ♦ the recent introduction of the first on-line Mercy Associates group this group has two people experiencing the formation process now and provides an option for Mercy Associates living remotely from any of the existing groups.

- existing key resources, the Formation Resource and Administrative Handbook, were reviewed and some amendments will be recommended in due course to the ILT;
- the newly developed self-paced manual for Safeguarding training was also reviewed, and this will be ready to be published imminently. This resource is likely to be adapted for use by other ministries where staff or volunteers were unable to attend face-to-face seminars in 2019.

Ellen Geraghty provided input of the work of the Mission Integration team, of which Mercy Associates forms a part.

Because the Mercy Associate Leadership group meets infrequently, a great deal of discussion is packed into each meeting. Despite the alarmingly long agenda, our discussions were sprinkled liberally with laughter, inspired by everything from the quirks of human nature as they play out in the Mercy Associates groups through to a Powerpoint presentation by Anne on Daisy's first year of life (adored Labrador).

The wisdom of the Mercy Associate representatives was of immense benefit to the quality of discussions, with workable solutions developed to respond to the opportunities and challenges facing the ISMAPNG Mercy Associates movement.

Over the next few months, updates on some of the toics discussed will be sent to groups so they are aware of changes being made.

Mercy Global Presence:

Global wisdom inspiring local conversations

Mercy Associates bring the worldwide story of mercy to life in new ways in our local communities. As we share mercy with those around us, we also seek nourishment to sustain us in our faith and strengthen our sense of belonging to a global community of mercy. One development which has much to offer us is Mercy Global Presence, which I have been inspired by in my other role with ISMAPNG, at the Mercy Hub in Melbourne. This article describes Mercy Global Presence, in the hope that Mercy Associates groups will be encouraged to explore the rich resources on offer.

Mercy Global Presence is a global initiative led by Mercy International Association, which shares high-quality content developed by sisters and partners in mercy, in a sixteen-month journey from September 2019 until June 2021. The journey will move through four segments - *Global; Mercy; Presence*; and *Integrated* — each containing four months of material, organized thematically. In the 'Global' segment which finished in December 2019, the themes were: *Cosmos/Cosmology; Earth and Integral Ecology; People and Deep Social Change*; and *Incarnate God in Cosmos and in Person of Jesus*. At its heart, the intention behind Mercy Global Presence is to describe and recognize Mercy Global Presence in our midst, often by shaping new language, new spirituality and new theology. In a globalized world in which the displacement of persons

and degradation of Earth are reaching ever more extreme levels, how can Mer-

cy Global Presence – as it is lived and articulated by people of mercy, including Mercy Associates - be a countercultural sign?

Resources are released monthly on the Mercy Global Presence microsite, with breaks during the northern and southern hemisphere summers. Each month begins with an introduction by Elizabeth Davis rsm, which is available on video as well as in print. Other contributions to each theme include theological imaginings, an artistic response, and voices from grassroots ministry and diverse perspectives. The theme *People and Deep Social Change*, for example, was vividly illustrated by stories shared by students training as teachers in South Sudan, alongside a reflection by a Mercy sister working in this ministry. I encourage you to visit the site (see web address below) and immerse yourself in the resources you will find there. There is much to be gained from reading these materials reflectively and letting them speak into your local situation.

While reading the resources is enriching, in my experience it is in conversation with others that they really come alive. And it is in this way that I hope they can be a valuable asset for Mercy Associates - and that Mercy Associates will join the global conversation inspired by Mercy Global Presence. At a Mercy Hub gathering last year, for example,

MERCY GLOBAL PRESENCE

Mercy Global Presence resources can be used creatively as groups find helpful. Each month includes a Facilitators' Guide, with suggested ways to structure conversations, but adaptation to the needs of the group is

The next theme - *Faith Traditions & Mercy* - will be released on 25th March 2020, within the 'Mercy' segment. Sister Beryl spoke about 'The History and Vision of Mercy Associates', which was very inspiring listening to Catherine McAuley's story and her original vision of serving the poor, which had not been to establish a religious congregation. We

heard about the setting up of 'The House of Mercy' and the founding of the Sisters of Mercy in 1831, followed by the arrival of Sister Ursula Frayne in Perth (1846) and Sister Vincent Whitty in Rockhampton (4 August, 1873).

A 'snapshot' of ISMAPNG today and the global scene of Mercy Works was given, but who are Mercy Associates?

The group in Rockhampton formed in 1991, associated with the Sisters of Mercy and lively discussion occurred around the white and black habits the earlier sisters had to wear, amongst other things. It also brought back fond memories of some of our earlier Sisters.

We heard that Mercy Associates are lay women and men who are in-

spired by Catherine McAuley's charism of Mercy and who know God's loving kindness in their own lives and wish to share this with others.

A source of great comfort and hope for all of us was to hear that it is in the 'ordinariness' of our lives that we live out Catherine's message.

We thanked Sister Beryl for enlightening us all.

Lean in and feel the pain

It can be very easy for you to become discouraged when you feel as though all of your sources of hope have gone away.

Then you feel like you are going to collapse under the weight of such hopelessness, and drown.

Getting your hopeful sight back: resuscitating any sense of trust is hard to build again when such times come around.

But know this

Jesus, the Christ, the anointed one, is right at this moment,

Yes, you have to own and feel the bruises and wounds, the injustices and concrete evil that seems to suffocate you at times.

As painful as it is,

In reading and reflecting on this writing by David Haas a verse from Isaiah came into my mind:

I am doing something new – a roadway in the wilderness, rivers in the desert. I will make a way for you. Is. 43:1

I have found it is in our quiet longings and greatest defeats God moves toward us.

And I'd like to conclude with another quote from Isaiah:

For I am the Lord your God who takes hold of your right hand and says to you, 'Do not fear; I will help you.' Is. 41:13

The above reflection seems very appropriate in this season and Lent and while the world does battle with the Coronavirus. It is within the embrace of God we find Mercy and Hope.

Timor Leste focuses on Year of the Eucharist

The Timor Leste Mercy Associates group held its first meeting for 2020 just over three weeks ago. Our meetings this year will be on the second Saturday of each month, the next one is March 14.

The spiritual focus in this Diocese is **The Year of the Eucharist**, so it's appropriate that the Eucharist becomes our theme also. The content of our first meeting is below:

JESUS' TABLE MINISTRY - THE GIFT OF MERCY IS SHARED

Before Jesus instituted the Eucharist, he participated in a <u>table ministry</u>. On these occasions the <u>gift of mercy</u> was offered to those who were in need of physical or spiritual healing. When Jesus offered spiritual advice at the table it was not always accepted.

1. REFLECTION - WHAT CAN WE LEARN FROM JESUS' MINISTRY?

Jesus' table ministry was an act of hospitality. He was always showing loving kindness, compassion and offering opportunities to welcome the outcasts and forgive sinners.

Jesus often used meals to engage with people and teach them important lessons about God's loving Mercy.



Let us look at some examples of Jesus' table ministry and see how Jesus' ministry is relevant to our present day living

Dining with the enemy—Levi (Lk. 5:27-32)

JESUS' TABLE MINISTRY - THE GIFT OF MERCY IS OFFERED

In Jesus' time tax collectors were despised by their people. Tax collectors were Jews who were collecting Rome's taxes and then keeping some of the tax money for themselves (Lk.19:8). The tax collectors were considered enemies of the Jews as were the Romans.

2. MEDITATION - (Lk 5:32)

3. SHARING

Jesus eating with a tax collector was not acceptable by the Jews.

We know that Jesus was not simply accepting an invitation to Levi's house, but He had a purpose in mind.

'Follow me and be my disciple'. Jesus wanted to show his loving Mercy, acceptance and forgiveness to this outsider, Levi.

4. MERCY IN ACTION

Do you know any 'outsiders' or 'enemies' who are in need of Jesus' love and mercy?

How can you respond to their need in a compassionate way?

5. FURTHER REFLECTION

During the month before we meet, members have been invited to reflect further on Jesus' table ministry.

After Pope John Paul II visited the site to say a Mass in 1993, he approached the Franciscan Brothers to build a Monastery there. Now there is a lovely quiet place for Mass, Retreats and Reflection as well as the Hill with hundreds of thousands of crosses and sets of Rosary Beads.

Townsville Mercy Associates were privileged to join the Sisters of Mercy, and staff from co-ministries in a retreat day with Sr Mary Pat Garvin rsm in March. Thanks to the Institute and Catholic Religious Australia Sr Mary Pat visited regional centres and showed us an interesting process for reading Catherine's letters in such a way that these inspired our own ministries today. Sr Mary Pat encouraged those attending to see Catherine's letters as speaking across time and space 'because her deepest desires, values, beliefs and commitments *reside in our own hearts and lives*'. Within this framework we engaged with the letters which revealed Catherine 's life and work as a Social Mystic and challenged us to see those in our community 'whose relationship with Jesus unleashes social change today', our Social Mystics in 2020!

On the second day Sr Mary Pat welcomed the Sisters of St Joseph who joined the group for a presentation on 'Centred in God... sent on Mission'. All present were inspired by a view of Lectio Divina in a broad definition of 'a way of being in life' and reminded that *memory* releases energy for discipleship. Drawing on a vision based on these concepts, Sr Mary Pat encouraged those present to 'take what I know and go deeper'. Participants agreed Sr Mary Pat certainly energized, reinvigorated, introduced a new 'spark' in her call for us to 'befriend our life'.

MercyWorks—Seeing Hilltop: What A Wonderful View!

Hilltop Road Public School's Community Centre in Sydney supports families in the school through a variety of initiatives, one of which is a very popular English conversation class for mothers.

On 17 February, Sally Bradley, Executive Director of Mercy Works and Paul Taylor, Mercy Connect Sydney Coordinator, visited this vibrant Community Hub. They spent time with the women and also met with the Community Liaison Officer, Catherine Gregory, to find out more about the benefits of the classes.

Mercy Connect currently provides trained volunteer mentors to assist in the adult conversation class held each Monday afternoon. Three Mercy Connect volunteers provide expert guidance to the mothers learning English each week. An additional advantage of attending the class is the opportunity to interact with the other mothers and build friendships.

According to Catherine Gregory, the outstanding success of the adult conversation class has been as a result of the work of the volunteers. In recognition of the progress made, the principal of the primary school has asked if Mercy Connect volunteers can provide mentors to support newly arrived refugee students at the school. A request to which Mercy Works can happily respond!

They are based on the Scripture: For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me. [Mt 25:34,36] The reflection questions are very challenging. So far, we have shared upon:

To feed the hungry – the reflection question which raised the most conversation, was Identify an 'angel of grace' in your life who embodies this work of mercy. Many names were mentioned.

<u>To give drink to the thirsty</u> – The challenging question was: *Our hearts are restless Lord until they rest in thee.* God thirsts for us all.

Safeguarding Training

During 2019, most Mercy Associates in Australia attended a Safeguarding training seminar. Some Mercy Associates were not able to attend because of illness or other commitments, however this is compulsory training for all Mercy Associates. The only exceptions are those who are unable to attend meetings or undertake any active ministries, which may be due to advanced age or illness.

To provide an extra training option, a 'self-paced' manual has been developed for Mercy Associates. To complete this, Mercy Associates will need to liaise with their Network Facilitator so that the materials can be provided and the correct records can be kept.

Though self-paced, the manual does need a guiding person to help, and this needs to be a Mercy Associate who did the

2019 training seminar. The materials needed are the self-paced manual, the Code of Conduct, the laminated contacts list, the record of attendance form and the form to sign to indicate acceptance of the Code of Conduct. The training will take around one and a half to two hours and is best completed in one session.

The manual, along with more detailed information about how to use it, will be sent by email within the next few weeks. It is essential that all Mercy Associates who attend meetings or undertake a ministry of some kind complete the training by August 2020.
