And the aspen trees were shaking the sweetest music out of their leaves.


And that was followed by; guess what, a momentous and beautiful silence

# Announcing a new Online Mercy Associates Group

Mercy Associates is delighted to welcome two new Associates, Mandy Bosson (upper right photo) and Natalia Pecherskaya (lower right photo), who together with Anne Pate, Mercy Associates Network Facilitator (Victoria), will form a new Mercy Associates group meeting online. Catherine McAuley's words – "It began with 2, Sister Doyle and I" – reveal the small beginnings of what has now become an international association of Sisters of Mercy. Inspired by her pioneering spirit, the Mercy Associates movement continues to grow and adapt to new challenges, such as how to facilitate membership for people living in places where there are no existing groups. In this case, Mandy lives in Adelaide, while Natalia lives in St Petersburg, Russia. They each approached Mercy Associates in 2019, and after some discussion with the ILT, we decided to offer them formation online with a view to setting up an ongoing online group. The conversations during formation have been rich and interesting; we have shared from our different church and cultural contexts as we explored the life and ministry of Catherine, and what it means to live out the charism of Mercy today. After the online Commitment Ceremony on 26<sup>th</sup> November, the journey will continue, as we form a faith community in which we engage with mercy and support one another's ministry. The story of the new online Mercy Associates group is unusual and owes much to the willingness of Mandy and Natalia to venture into the unknown, just as Catherine did when she opened the House of Mercy in 1827. # Mercy Day celebrations

#### Gunnedah

The Sisters of Mercy were honoured by parishioners and students from St Xavier's School and St Mary's College Gunnedah on Mercy Day.

The Mass was con-celebrated by Fr John McHugh and Fr Vince Amaro in St Joseph's Church, with members of the Mercy Associates presenting flowers to Sr Gabrielle Foley, Sr Regina McInerney and Sr Christine Belling.

Senior St Mary's College students also made a floral presentation on behalf of the two schools. The Mercy Associates hosted a morning tea in St Joseph's Hall after Mass.

The arrival of the Sisters of Mercy in Gunnedah in January 1879 was a blessing for the parish and the wider community. Within a year the sisters had built a convent, opened two schools and welcomed boarders from around the region. In the following years, branch convents were opened all around the north west to provide education to one and all.

The Sisters opened Gunnedah's first secondary school, the town's first business college, the first nursing home at the convent, and Gunnedah's first hostel for aged care - McAuley.

## Education making a difference—Ruth's story

Ruth considers herself blessed. She went to school beyond Year 8, unlike most of the other girls she grew up with in a remote part of Papua New Guinea.



Because of support from Mercy Works, Ruth had the opportunity to receive a formal education and is soon to complete her studies in Community Health Nursing.

This has changed Ruth's future by opening up a whole new world of possibilities. This is what access to educational opportunity does. It offers young people the helping hand they need to realise their full potential and lead a very different life.

Ruth's parents are subsistence farmers in lowara. They fled across the border from West Papua in 1984 and were settled in the camps established for these refugees in East Awin. Her mother and father worked hard to feed and clothe Ruth and her four brothers and two sisters. But they barely survived.

Ruth liked going to school in Iowara, but when she finished Year 8, there was no further formal education available there. She was determined to continue learning because she wanted to be a nurse to help people like her mum and dad and sisters and brothers living in isolated villages.

She would need to move to Kiunga so that she could improve her literacy and numeracy skills to be accepted into nursing school. Coming from such a poor family, Ruth could not afford to pay for a safe place to live while she studied.

That is how she found herself at the La Sagesse Hostel. This was an environment where she could live safely in the company of other young women from remote areas of the Western Province. There she felt a real sense of belonging. She flourished with the support of Sr Adeline who helps the students with their studies and more than that, she plays a crucial role of being their mentor.

Without the chance to live there, she would never have gone to the Rumginae School of Nursing to be trained as a Community Health Nurse.

Ruth already knows what she will do when her training is finished as she explains in an excited and animated tone, 'I hope to be able to work in our own village in lowara by helping train Village Health Volunteers, or I might get a position in a Health Outpost'.





The experience of living at the hostel provided by Mercy Works, in those first couple of years away from home, became an essential part of her educational and life journey, as she reflects: 'I feel more confident in myself. I feel like I can be relied on and I feel good to be able to contribute to my community, and our society for a better Papua New Guinea'.


Jesus, Son of the living God, have mercy on me.

Mary, Seat of Mercy, pray for us.


