'In October, 1836, when Catherine McAuley first arrived, sight unseen, in Charleville, a town in southwest Ireland where she hoped to establish a new Mercy foundation. She became immediately fearful that the Mercy mission could not succeed there, and she thought seriously of taking her sisters back to Dublin. The convent given them was so damp that their clothes were wet each morning, the house was not conveniently located for ministry; and the town itself was so small and poor, there was little chance of new members joining the community.

Then one day as Catherine was walking in Charleville, she met the Christ-sent reason why they had come to Charleville in the first place. She met a poor old woman who greeted her and exclaimed: 'Ah! It is the Lord who drove you in amongst us!'

That settled it! The sisters remained in Charleville and are there to this day. Our Bathurst community was founded from Charleville in 1866.' Story told by Mary Sullivan – McAuley Ministry Conference
