Vision Updating Project - DRAFT

Our **Vision Statement** and **Vision in Action** were adopted in 2016. At the Mercy Associates Leadership Group (MALG) meeting in March, we realised it was time to review these and update them as needed. A group comprising Jo Rix (Ballarat), Helen Fowler (Young), Marg Trevethan and Anne Pate worked on the draft on the following page.

Their task was to edit the current *Vision Statement* and *Vision in Practice* to reflect the current identity of the ISMAPNG Mercy Associates community. The final draft will be discussed at the MALG meeting in 2023.

The **Vision Statement** is the Mercy Associates mission/identity statement of purpose. The first two sentences name the purpose. The remaining sentences show how we envision giving expression to our purpose.

The **Vision in Practice** elaborates on what Associates do to live out the Vision.

As 2022 draws to a close, we invite groups and individual Mercy Associates to reflect on their year, using this draft as a resource to guide the process. Consider questions such as:

In what ways does the content of the Vision Statement and Vision in Practice reflect the meetings and activities your group has undertaken this year?

Are there particular lines or phrases that resonate with how you see your participation in the Mercy Associates community?

As you ponder the document, are there new ways of thinking and acting that your group might consider for 2023?

Griffith Centenary (+1)

The Sisters of Mercy celebrated our 101 years Centenary in early September from our primary school St Patrick's. Three sisters arrived from Albury on 5th September 1921. They started the school two days later with 15 students – so the school and Sisters have had a presence in Griffith for 101 years! For the centenary, the school erected a tiled wall. As you can see one side was from 1921-1965; the other side the modern years.

Sr Rita Savage (in black jacket), our oldest sister, pupil and teacher in the school. Sr Theresa Foley (in coloured vest left side) was also a pupil and started in 1956. Sr Patricia Johnson (with Rita) was also a pupil in1960's and a teacher in school. Our last sister principal finished in the early 1990's. The present principal Michael Morel also a past pupil. On the first side of wall you see the first Parish Priest Fr O'Dea. You may be able to see the Sisters in black on the wall.

One taught at the school.

Another sent her children to the school.



Most of the Gladstone Associates have a strong connection to the Charism of the Sisters of Mercy, Gladstone. This connection has been a long one.

The new Century (20th) had only just begun when a small community of three Sisters of Mercy arrived in Gladstone to commence a partnership with Catholic Education. So Star of the Sea Primary School came to be. The Sister remained until 1982 when the Marist Sisters arrived.

The need for Secondary education was seen, so the Sisters took on Co-ed classes under the name of Stella Maris in 1966. They then went into partnership with the Marist Brothers in 1968. The Sisters remained at Chanel College until 1994. A Pastoral presence was maintained by Sisters Maria Goretti, Mary Moynihan and Beryl Amedee well into the 2000s. A deep hand of friendship and a warm mutual trust has grown between the Sisters and Parishioners.

The charism of Catherine McAuley has always been strong, nurtured by teachers, ancillary staff and parents alike. Currently, the Mercy Associates along with the Principal and Head of McAuley House would like to take "SMALL STEPS" to impart to all students a greater and deeper knowledge of Catherine, her life and the Mercy" message. There are nine present and past Associates who have worked for numerous years at Chanel College.
