Opening Ritual

Facilitator or Prayer Leader. Light a candle and hold it while saying this prayer. (If in a group, pause after each sentence to allow the passing of the candle from one person to the next).

Pray (together):

We carry this candle in solidarity with First Nations peoples in this country and around the world. We carry this candle in openness to truth-telling and acknowledgement of the unjust and cruel treatment of Australia's first people.

We carry this candle in love and compassion for those dispossessed,

those taken from their families as children, those abused and treated with derision.

We carry this candle for those who face racism on a daily basis.

We carry this candle in support of an indigenous voice that will enrich Australia.

Pause for a few moments to reflect on this prayer, and also the portrait of Catherine by Megan Seres.

Consider the following poems.

What do they suggest about the Mercy journey into the future? What concerns you about the road ahead?

Once you step out, you will see for yourself how nothing could have made you ready for this road that will take you from what you know to what you cannot perceive except, perhaps, in your dreaming or as it gives a glimpse in prayer. (Extract from *Pilgrim: Poems by David Whyte* 2012. David Whyte)
