## From Maureen—visiting Papua New Guinea

Recently I spent two and a half weeks in Papua New Guinea attending a three-day Catherine McAuley Services Ltd (CMSL) board meeting in Port Moresby Papua New Guinea. The rest of the time was in Wewak with our PNG Sisters and supporting Dr Elissa Roper who was teaching a unit for a Program of Theology.

CMSL is an incorporated company owned by the Institute which exists to support programs and projects in PNG. Currently it oversees three programs or projects: Program of Theology for religious women in PNG, Cookhouses 'n Tanks A lot (CTAL) and Mercy Life Skills Training (MLST). The current board comprises three Australian Sisters of Mercy and two Papua New Guinea lay people.

The Board meeting was held at the Bishop's Conference Centre situated a mere 10 minutes from the airport. It provides accommodation and has several rooms for workshops and conferences. It is a real transition hub, a meeting place for people moving to or from overseas and for people transiting within PNG. We meet Bishops, priests, religious and others who are known throughout the Catholic Bishop's conference network. We intentionally hold these extended board meeting days in PNG or Cairns to make it easy for our PNG Directors to attend in person and to strengthen our commitment and understanding of Melanesian culture.

We invited two guest speakers to lead us in discussions a) about Melanesian culture and b) the challenges and difficulties of a foreign company operating in PNG. It also afforded us the opportunity to invite three PNG Mercy sisters and one Rosary sister to join us to share their stories of the programs on the ground and to participate in our discussions. Sisters Theresia Tina (MLST), Maryanne Kolkia (representing the PNG Community Leadership) Rachael Waisman (potential MLST) and Marie Therese RS (animator in teaching of modules Program of Theology). Theresia led prayer and conversations about the Mercy story in PNG and the early days of the Program of Theology.

It was a good experience despite many delays and cancellation of flights domestically and internationally. The internet connection was good which allowed us to hold a zoom session on the Friday with the Program Managers in Australia. I particularly valued the presence of sisters Theresia Tina, Maryanne Kolkia, Rachael Waisman and Marie Therese Jorumbu. It brought home to me the incredible value of 'see me, hear me, know me' and the importance of hearing things from their Melanesian perspective.

On 24 July I travelled to **Wewak** with Elissa Roper, Manager of the Program of Theology. We stayed with our sisters in their residence in the grounds of Divine Word University St Benedict's Campus. Elissa was teaching a

unit of Theology 'Being in touch: Effective Communication of the Gospel.' She had thirteen sisters from four congregations in her class. Nine undertaking a basic diploma and four an advanced diploma. Elissa led the class in a room provided by the Divine Word University, which afforded the use of fans and projector when power was available.

Currently two sisters are in community – Sisters Terri Congi who works at the local regional hospital as a community health nurse and Doreen Manick who is part of the Pastoral Team in the Diocese. They have a lovely layperson Schola who keeps house and cooks for them. There is another sister Sophie Somiak who also works and lives near the regional hospital. Sister Rachael Waisaman the new Community Leader PNG was also there.

The Program of Theology has been operating for eight years, it will be a real milestone when a number of sisters complete their advanced diploma towards the end of this year. The basic diploma students graduated from the Madang Campus, but thought is being given to the advanced diploma students graduating locally, that is at the St Benedict's Campus in Wewak and the Holy Trinity Campus in Mt Hagen. It will be a major achievement for these women and will hopefully strengthen their ministry activities.

It brought home to me the incredible value of 'see me, hear me, know me' and the importance of hearing things from their Melanesian perspective.

Sister Rachael Waisman introduced me to three laypeople who have worked closely with her creating awareness of a simple cervical cancer screening technique in Wewak and surrounding villages. To their delight it has been taken up by Catholic Health Services and garnered the support of the doctor responsible for Obstetrics and Gynaecology at the regional hospital. This project was supported by Mercy Works and has now been handed over to the abovementioned agencies. Rachael has moved on to supporting and teaching life skills to 'widows' in her place of residence and in her home village along the coast about 45 minutes from Wewak. These women are widows, single women or women who have been abandoned by their husbands or they have left their husbands due to domestic violence. I spent a morning

Three of the women who support Rachael are members of Mercy Friends, Rhonda a midwife, another Grace a senior lecturer in the school of nursing and Ester a teacher at Mercy Secondary school Yappos. They were keen to share stories especially about Mercy Friends. They have an organised structure, a yearly schedule of meetings and planned activities. The activities are about raising funds to donate to different causes they have identified – prisoners, flood relief, helping a family whose house was burnt down. They are really committed and expressed a desire to have a retreat or some explicit formation on mercy and the gospel.

with one of the groups, heard their stories, saw what they have been learning. Their lives are far from easy.

I know that all the people I spent time with would be grateful if you remembered them in your prayer.

### Rockhampton Associates inspired by a Gladstone Associate

On 12 August, the Rockhampton Mercy Associates welcomed Annette Rowe to come and meet with them. Annette has been the co-ordinator of the Gladstone Mercy Associates since 2012 and one of their founding members from 1992. Her choice for her presentation was "My life inspired and motivated by Catherine and the Rockhampton Mercy Sisters."

The morning began with Annette joining us for Mass and sharing our Mercy liturgy.

Our Presider for Mass was Father Samuel Okoroafor, whose homily focused on Faith and Mercy, (which Father Samuel explained go together), as well as listening to (and not just hearing) the Word of God.

Morning tea after Mass is always a great time to catch up with one another and this occasion was no exception. A brief business meeting followed, which commenced with our remembering and praying for our Mercy Associate friends who were unable to be with us due to illness or other difficult circumstances.

Annette shared her faith journey with us, beginning with her family, especially through her father and then continuing with the Sisters of Mercy, when she went nursing. In the Mercy Sisters, Annette was "able to see the face of Christ."

Annette went on to say that she has been inspired by the words from Mahatma Gandhi to "be the change that you wish to see in the world."

Life enriching experiences in Annette's life have included a trip to a slum in Mumbai, India where she vividly remembers that bottle tops were collected to finance one fridge for 3,000 people! Providing the "gift of mercy" to workers in the community in Woorabinda for four and half years was also a very rewarding experience.

In 2016 Annette went on a pilgrimage to Baggot Street in Dublin, where she was able to walk where Catherine walked, see where she died and pray at her grave, amongst other things. This obviously resonated deeply with Annette and the 'mercy works', which continue to be her life.

We were also informed about some of the activities of the Gladstone Mercy Associates, one of which involves receiving and responding to the prayer requests from the seafarers, which are placed in the Seafarers Chapel. (I thought, how beautiful is that!)

We concluded with the Prayer for Beatification of Catherine McAuley but not before listening to one of Annette's much loved songs by Graeme Connors, "we can change the world."

Claire Stitt sincerely thanked Annette for showing us how she was being the change, which she wanted to see in our world!



## **Mercy Ministry Formation Network Conference 2023**

Christine Convery, Annette Rowe and Marg Trevethan attended the MMFN conference on behalf of Mercy Associates. We found the whole experience very valuable. In both the formal and informal sessions we were able to network with the other attendees and we participated in inspiring presentations and workshops.

There were 34 of us altogether, drawn from a wide range of Mercy ministries including Mercy Ministry Companions, Mercy Partners, Mercy Works, Mercy Global Action, Mercy Hub, Young Mercy Links, Mercy Secondary Schools Association, the Seville Conference Centre and congregations of the Sisters of Mercy in Australia and NZ. It was both eye opening and challenging to realise just how active and alive the mission of mercy is for the world.

We found it enlightening, and encouraging, to discover that so many Mercy initiatives were fostering mercy and in such diverse ways. The purpose of the MMFN itself is to:

- build a community of common interest and mutual support
- facilitate sharing resources, for mercy ethos and mission effectiveness, and
- provide a centre for formation of the formators.

A presentation on Resilience was given by Jo Casamento the Communications and Fundraising Coordinator at Mercy Works. Mercy Works is the development arm of the Sisters of Mercy in Australia and Papua New Guinea and works in partnership with vulnerable communities and local organisations domestically and in the Asia Pacific region to build capacity, dignity, and self-reliance. We heard some of the real-life stories of people being assisted by Mercy in these communities.

Denise Fox rsm spoke of the project, 'Opening Doors',

with MIA (Mercy International Association), and the need for formation and networking to continue to support the work of Mercy around the world. She highlighted that the Mercy Charism is very invitational - a call to be a part of the work - and an invitation to be transformed. She extended this invitation to all of us, and it affirmed in us the priority we give in our Mercy Associates groups to ongoing prayer, formation and action in the Mercy way.

A highlight for us was the prayer we shared. The very meaningful opening prayer had an indigenous focus and the next morning we were led by the group from New Zealand. In the workshops we were focused on Mercy Spirituality, Mercy Culture, Mercy Prayer and Ritual and Mercy Leadership. In these we were introduced to Caroline Thompsons wonderful book *Be as Shining Lamps* Preserving, Nurturing, Reimagining the Mercy Charism. This is a 'Handbook for Formation & Reflection' packed full or prayers, images, reflections and information that would be useful for prayer and formation in any MA group.

It is great to know we are part of this Network which provides us the opportunity to support each other in the work that we are doing together. Mercy Ministry Formation Network is a gathering place, real and virtual, for women and men, lay and religious who are working, or who are interested, in formation in mercy ethos and mission effectiveness within mercy ministries and other groups. It is planned that the group will come together twice each year, once in a gathering planned for Melbourne in 2024 and another time by Zoom.

We felt affirmed in all we are doing in Mercy Associates and felt the privilege of being one part of the ongoing and powerful story of Mercy in the world.

## DIANNE'S DIARY-VOLUNTEERING IN TIMOR LESTE

Mercy Associate **Dianne Hanna** has been in Timor Leste since March this year. Below are notes and photos from her time working with local people in this developing nation.

This is when I first arrived. A friend had given me two laptops which I was able to give to the Franciscan Hospitaller sisters when I met with them and Armandina, a university

student I have been supporting through the sisters to continue her university studies to become a teacher.

One laptop was then given to Armandina and the other returned to the boarding house for the almost 40 secondary student girls who board with the sisters.













Then there was the arrival of the dental equipment and consumables that I spent most of last year trying to get donated from different suppliers for the Timorese veterans clinic in Baucau, Timor Leste.

It was rewarding to be able to help unpack the container to receive the two pallets of equipment which included a dental chair, x-ray, etc., as well as support the other NGO's that had items in the container packed by Rotary. It was hard work as it was all done by physical labour.

Then last month I was able to visit the clinic where they

held a healthy teeth program for students in the local school.

The program included cleaning the students' teeth and applying silver fluoride as well as educating students about maintaining good teeth. All students were provided with a toothbrush and toothpaste to take home with them.

Then I was called to go back to the place I volunteered with in 2016-2020 to help with some finance issues they had. It was just what I needed to get out of the city and reconnect with old friends.







## Gladstone—a statue of Catherine and a connection with local Seafavers

It was with great joy that members for the Gladstone Mercy Associates, when they visited Chanel College and saw the new **Catherine McAuley's** life size bronze statue, in situ. Catherine is seated on an extended bench with a child and Marcellin Champagnat. Two of the Houses at the College are named McAuley and Marcellin House.

Dr Susan Bunkum, Principal, said that "It has been two years in the making ... but now it is here, it has been well worth the wait!" For a recent local 'free' magazine advertising Catholic Education Week, two students from each Catholic school were photographed with the statue.

The Mercy Associates with parishioners, visited the Seafarers Centre to learn firsthand about the **Gladstone Seafarers** and how we may be able to support the volunteers who assist there. There are several Associates who pray the prayers requested, that the Seafarers record when they visit the Chapel.

Some of the 'eye openers' shared by the Manager on behalf of the Seafarers, were things we take for granted:

Being able to take their shoes off and stand on grass;

Being able to reach out to family when on shore, on the Wi-Fi at the Centre;

Receiving parcels from home that have been sent months ago;

Being able to go shopping at the Centre and in the City due to volunteer bus drivers.

Sadly, we need to share with our many friends, that Kathleen O'Neill died peacefully while in care. She has been an Honorary Associate for some time now due to her frailty and needing to live closer to family. A Requiem Mass was held for her back here in Gladstone, her hometown, with her family and many Associates in attendance. May Kathleen rest in peace.

The husband and wife who run the program provide the youth with accommodation and meals to support them as well as some pocket money to buy personal items like soap.






### When's your birthday?
