Mercy Day

"I love You, Lord
For your mercy never fails me
All my days, I've been held in Your hands
From the moment that I wake up,

Oh, I will sing of the goodness of God"

Mercy is one of God's most evocative attributes. The ancient Israelites learned that their God was a merciful God who would not abandon or destroy them (Deuteronomy



4:31). The prophet Micah asked what God required from His people. The answer? To love mercy, to do justice and to walk humbly before God (Micah 6:8). But what does mercy look like? Mercy is so much more than charitable thoughts to others. Mercy evokes action. God is merciful, not because He is God but because He

demonstrates His mercy to us. Mercy is love in action. Mercy involves others. It does not discriminate. Mercy originates in God. The Apostle Peter wrote that we are the people of God because we have received His mercy (1 Peter 2:10). This is key. We cannot give away that which we do not have. We are merciful not because we are nice

people, but because we have experienced and received the mercy of God. And because of that experience, we can now freely give away what God has given us.
