
I hope that your Mercy Day celebrations were joyful and prayerful and wish you well for these remaining months of 2025.

# MERCY FRIENDS IN EAST SEPIK CELEBRATING PNG 50 YEARS GOLDEN JUBILEE OF INDEPENDENCE WITH MISSIONS TO THE CORRECTIONAL SERVICES

Papua New Guinea celebrated its 50 years Golden Jubilee of Independence on the 16<sup>th</sup> of September 2025. Prior to the actual date of celebration, the PNG government declared 50 days pre-independence celebration commencing on the 28<sup>th</sup> June 2025.

First and importantly the Mercy Friends in PNG sincerely acknowledge God for blessing us with a beautiful nation, the Australian Government for granting PNG a peaceful independence back in 1975, and the early missionaries especially the Sisters of Mercy in Australia who missioned in most parts of our country. We are blessed and thankful to be part of ISMAPNG and we continue to maintain and uphold our relationship between our nations.

Mercy Friends and the Sisters in East Sepik celebrated the 50 years Golden Jubilee Independence celebration with a visit to the Boram Correctional Services. We donated more than K3000 worth of fresh garden vegetables, saveloys and toiletries to help 430 inmates. The Officer in Charge for visits received the gift from us, stating the food items will help subside food rations as they are facing an influx of inmates each day.



The visit also coincides with our pilgrimage journey in helping the needy people, we offer prayers for the inmates that they will share and partake the food physically and repent from wrong-doing and receive Jesus as their Lord.

We are planning our last visit for the year to the retired priests and sisters' home of Wewak Diocese early in December before the Mercy Foundation Day.

### SIMBU PROVINCE, PAPUA NEW GUINEA— 14 WATER TANKS IN 28 DAYS!

In May, **Mercy Works** – in partnership with the Diocese of Kundiawa in Simbu Province, Papua New Guinea – undertook an ambitious project to install water tanks into 14 schools in just 28 days. Now hundreds of students, teachers and staff have much improved access to clean water for drinking, handwashing, cooking and cleaning.

Water and sanitation-related diseases are one of the leading causes of death for children under five years in PNG. Sadly, preventable illnesses resulting from inadequate water, sanitation, and hygiene practices claim the lives of children daily.

Prior to the installation of the new water tanks, students were required to carry their own water to school. They were often sourcing water from unreliable and unclean water sources such as rivers. Some schools were relying on old water tanks supplying poor quality water due to decay, algae growth and sediment buildup.

Mercy Works' newly installed water tanks are expected to decrease the prevalence of waterborne diseases in these school communities. Handwashing stations encourage the teachers to teach children good handwashing and sanitation practices.

For most schools, the water tank installation is the first significant building and maintenance update to the school in over 50 years. Happy, healthy children correlate with an increase in school attendance and improves a student's ability to focus on their studies.

'Access to reliable, safe water is a basic human right and we are passionate about the tangible health benefits of safe water for everyone. Mercy Works partnered with the Diocese of Kundiawa to identify fourteen local schools that would greatly benefit from a rainwater harvesting and storage system.' Says Andrew Lowry, Overseas Project Coordinator, Mercy Works.

With a group of local tradesmen, the installations began in early May and by mid-June all fourteen schools were equipped with operating water tanks.

Each water tank system includes guttering to collect the rainwater from the roof, a 'first flush diverter' to collect debris from the initial downpour and a disabled-accessible tap point for water collection.

The team of six skilled tradesmen delivered the necessary hardware and installed the tanks in some very challenging locations. This included having to physically carry supplies across rivers and through terrain impassable to vehicles. Terrain so challenging that the local communities helped to carrying in



the materials to ensure timely installation of the water tanks.

'We are so encouraged by the success of this initial water tank installation project that we intend to install more water tanks in Simbu over the next 12-months. We couldn't have achieved this work without the support of our incredible Mercy Works donors.' Says Andrew.

Mercy Works has been active in PNG for more than 19 years and is currently conducting projects in two comparatively remote locations in Western Province and in the highlands of Simbu Province. In Simbu, Mercy Works has conducted livelihood and



training projects to improve the financial situation of local people. This has included the establishment of the 'Leave No One Behind' micro financing program through the creation of small village savings and loans collectives.

## New Integral Ecology Framework Launched

During the Season of Creation and the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of *Laudato Si'*, our Institute has recently launched a new integral ecology framework to guide our work in this field for the coming years. Entitled "**A place to call home**", the cover image emerged at the last Chapter, where sisters were invited to reflect on ways of being and taking action together in new ways for these times.

Key themes from the framework include:

Integral Ecology is the contemporary expression of our Mercy and Faith Tradition (not an optional extra)

Integral Ecology means the interconnection of natural systems, human systems and spirituality

Creation is sacred and reveals the divine mystery to us

Paying attention to creation motivates us to live the 8<sup>th</sup> Work of Mercy "to care for our common home"

We are drawn into communion, a relationship with people, all of creation and divine mystery as it unfolds, *regardless of the outcome*.

This new document is called a 'framework' because it invites us all to consider many broad questions we are asking at this time, rather than declaring certain, clear actions in a time when so much changes and complexifies so rapidly.

#### What can I do?

Practical actions are clearly necessary and each place with its unique conditions will have different needs. Some ideas include:

Using as little energy as possible e.g. by insulating well, putting on double-glazed windows and sealing all gaps around doors and windows

Taking a meat free day per week (or more often)

Growing at least some of your own food to reduce supply chain issues and ensure local needs, either at home or in a community garden

Learn what species are under threat near you and what plants you can grow to encourage them

Provide multiple water spots for birds and reptiles in the backyard

Joining community groups restoring a local water way or bushland – Landcare, council tree plant-

ings, clean up events

Consider what public spaces could be improved for habitat, such as parish grounds

Becoming familiar with local conditions that may change in the future due to more intense storms, drought or fire - have a plan for yourself and an awareness of neighbours who may need support in emergencies.



## Seven steps of pilgrimage (ISMAPNG)

Below is the outline of the 'steps' we will undertake during the seven months of the Pilgrimage of Hope:

**Invitation to pilgrimage** and readiness for inner and outer engagement – as you accepted the invitation and prepare for the experience what is your desire for this experience? (June)

Packing and leaving – traditionally pilgrims pack lightly both in terms of their material belongings and in their readiness to empty their minds and hearts so as to leave space to engage fully with the journey ahead, what do you need to leave behind? (July)

Becoming present and attentive – on arrival how do you become present and attentive to the journey itself, to what is going on in you, to the encounter with others and your new surroundings? (August)

Alone and in community – what do you encounter in others as you journey, where is the time and space for reflection and renewal? (September)

Engagement and experience with unknown – at times you will experience the dislocation and alienation of the journey of that day, where you are not sure of the way forward or how to

make sense of what's going on inside. How will you stay engaged with the experience and with the journey to allow it to take you to new places, insights, understandings, discoveries of self and others? (October)

**Encounter the Sacred** – throughout the journey you are invited to contemplate the mystery of the sacred and to attend to the movement of the spirit both within yourself and revealed in your surroundings. (November)

**Pilgrim living** – at the end of your journey how will you continue to live out of the new insights, inspirations and understandings? (**December**)

#### **Enriching Icon presentation for Adelaide Associates**

The Adelaide Mercy Associates group had been considering having guest speakers at some of its meetings and inviting other people to attend. The guest speaker who spontaneously accepted the first invitation was Cynthia Griffin RSM who was asked to speak on a topic other groups have enjoyed with her, "Praying with Icons". The event was publicised through the Parish and those who came thoroughly enjoyed the presentation and the opportunity to meet the Associates and hear about the purpose and function of the group.

We asked Cynthia to write about her presentation and she obliged with:

"It was a great pleasure for me to join our Mercy Associates, together with a number of women who were attracted to this presentation called 'Praying with Icons". I had invited those attending to bring their own Icons with them and together with those of mine, we had a beautiful and colourful display for our sharing and reflection.

With the aid of a Power Point featuring aspects of our Mercy visit to Russia in 2018 (thanks to Margaret Broadbent RSM), I began with a brief introduction of the Icon's history and their development and central importance in the faith and liturgy of

The trip to Russia, that Cynthia referred to above, was organised by Margaret Broadbent RSM and Natalia Pecherskaya from St Petersberg. Through her friendship with Margaret over many years, her trips to Australia, and the trip to Russia of a group of our Sisters,

## Mercy Associate living the charism of Mercy

One of the ways in which I am able to contribute as a Mercy Associate is as a teacher in a wonderful program that sees indigenous religious sisters in Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands study theology and liturgy as part of their ongoing formation.

This initiative began about 8 years ago and since then I have made four trips to work with sisters from around 15 different congregations in the area of Liturgy. The first three (to Mt Hagen, Wewak and Honiara) were made together with Sr Ilsa Neicinieks, a Mercy sister from Adelaide, and the most recent (to Port Moresby) I made on my own.

It is so gratifying to be able to share with these sisters who work at the grass roots level in villages, parishes, schools and dioceses. Their lives are very spartan and their commitment to their ministries enormous. Many of them work under extremely challenging circumstances – both physically and mentally – as large areas of PNG are still very difficult to access and the huge variety of languages and cultures in that country call for much patience, understanding and respect.

Our aim is to enable the sisters to gain, first of all, their Diploma in Pastoral Ministry, and then move on to the Advanced Diploma in Theology and Pastoral Ministry. The final goal is that the local sisters themselves will become the teachers within the program.
